Denne: ancient arms



Thomas Denne, 1589

Ancient arms: azure, three leopards' heads affrontée, couped at the neck, or.

Arms (for Thomas Denne of Adisham, 1589):

Azure three bars ermine in chief, as many fleur-de-lis or.⁵⁷

Crest: on a chapeau vert turned up ermine a demi-peacock, wings expanded and elevated pp.

- A. **Robert de Dene** 'was believed to be a Norman of a family established in Kent before the Conquest, who held large estates in Sussex and Kent, as well as in the Duchy, and was 'pincerna' or butler to Edward the Confessor' (Burke); he was succeeded by:
- B. **Robert de Dene**, who was father of:
- C. **Ralph de Dene**, living in the time of William the Conqueror; landowner at Romney Marsh in Kent and in Sussex as lord of the manors of Buckhurst, Chaverham, Chalvington (near Lewes), Buggeley, Horsey, and Omleford, and founder of the Premonstratensian abbey of St Mary and St Laurence, Otham, in the parish of Hailsham, 1182.
He married **Sybella de Gatton**, sister of Robert de Gatton (Inquisition Post Mortem 1264, C 132 30/16), and had a son, Robert, his heir, and a daughter and co-heir:
- D1. El[is]a de Dene, m. firstly c. 1176 Sir Jordan Sackville, ancestor of the dukes of Dorset and lords Sackville,⁵⁸ whose family through her became possessed of property, including 'a well-built dwelling house', in Bayham (see Inquisition post mortem, 1273/4: C133/8/7); she m. secondly William de Marci. Ella, who inherited by will from her father Buckhurst and other estates in Sussex, in her widowhood endowed Bayham Abbey, near Lamberhurst, and as

- patroness, gave leave for the transference of the canons from Otham, founded by her father Ralph, to Bayham, 1207.
- D2. **Robert de Dene**, inherited the Kentish estates; gave his manor of Tilton in Selmeston to augment the endowments of Bayham Abbey. He married and had with two daughters, Alice, who further endowed Bayham Abbey, and Agnes, wife of — de Icklisham, a son:

- G. **Walter Denne**, of Denne Hill, living in 1256, whose son, another,
- H. **Walter Denne**, of Denne Hill, alive in the 9th Edward I [1281], enfeoffed of lands in Denne, was father of,
- I. **John Denne**, of Denne Hill, living in 1308, who was s. by his son,
- J. **Sir William Denne**, knt. of Denne Hill, who sat in Parliament for the city of Canterbury 19 Edward II [1325/6] and for the county of Kent in the 14th of the following reign [1340/1]. Sir William married **Elizabeth**, daughter and co-heir of **Hamo de Gatton**, of Boughton and Wormshill, Kent, sheriff of Kent 14 Ed. I (Inquisition Post Mortem, 1299, C 133/98/31), by his wife **Margaret**, and left a son and successor,
- K. **Richard Denne**, of Denne, living 1392/3, who m. **Agnes**, daughter of — **Apulderfield**, of Challock,⁵⁹ Kent, and had four sons, **Thomas**, Michael, John, and Robert, of whom the eldest,
- L. **Thomas Denne**, of Denne Hill, m. **Isabel**, daughter and heir of **Robert de Earde**, and had (with a younger son, Thomas, who died without issue in 1468), his successor,
- M. **John Denne**, of Denne Hill, who m. **Alice**, daughter of **Richard Arderne**, and had issue,
- N1. **Michael**, his heir, who follows.
- N2. **Thomas**, of Kingston, who m. **Agnes**, daughter of **William Eshehurst**, and had an only daughter and heiress,
- O1. **Avis**, m. to **John Crispe**, of Quicks, in the Isle of Thanet.
- N3. **Parnell**, m. to **William Keale**.

- N1. **Michael Denne**, of Denne Hill, living in the reigns of Edward IV and Henry VII [1461-1483 and 1485-1509], 'being descended by the marriages of his ancestors from the families of Apulderfield, Earde, Arderne, and Combe, among others, whose posterity spread in several branches resident not only in Canterbury and the several neighbouring parishes, but in West Kent likewise',⁶⁰ married **Christiana Coombe**, of Lymne, her father's co-heiress, and had issue,
- O1. **Thomas**, his heir, who follows.
- O2. **William**, of Tilmanstone; b. Kingston c. 1470; will dated 13 Jun 1524; had sons **Thomas**, **John**, **Edward** and **James**, and daughters **Helene**, **Crystane** and **Johane**.

- P1. James Denne, of Tilmanstone, m. and bur. Tilmanstone (will dated 23 Aug 1557); his sons were Peter, John, William and Thomas, and his daughters were Julyan and Cyselly.
- Q1. William Denne, m. St Andrew's, Tilmanstone, 14 Dec 1570, Margaret Harvey (the manors of Great and Little Barville in Tilmanstone had belonged to the Harvey family to 1518; several branches of the family adopted the coat of arms of their female ancestor Awstyn, the same as those of Jane Austen's family); and was bur. Tilmanstone 1 Jun 1599, leaving sons Thomas and Vincent and daughters Mary, Elizabeth, Martha (m. 1576 Samuel Pittock) and Sara.

- P3. **William Denne**, of Kingston, in Kent, b. c. 1402; received the manor of Bursted from his father; m. c. 1533 **Agnes** (d. 1588), daughter of **Nicholas Tufton** (b. c. 1475; d. c. 1 Dec 1538), of Tufton in Northiam, Sussex, grandfather of John Tufton, 1st baronet (cr. 1611; and great-grandfather of Nicholas Tufton, created the first Baron Tufton of Tufton 1626 and first Earl of Thanet 1628), by **Margaret** (b. Cranbrook c. 1477; d. Northiam, Sussex, 1538), dau. and heiress of **John Hever**, of Cranbrook (whose arms, *gules, a cross argent*, with label, were born by Nicholas Tufton), and was bur. Kingston 21 Oct 1572 and by his will, proved at Canterbury, by John Coppyn, and Sir Henry Crisp, trustees, devised property at Adisham, Well, and Beaksbourne, to his second son, **Thomas Denne**, having by her had issue:
- Q1. **Vincent Denne**, of Kingston, b. c. 1534; educ. All Souls' College, Oxon, BCL 1555, DCL 1569, fellow, LL.D.; official of Canterbury commn. by Archbishop Parker as Commissary-Gen. 1563; b. 1526; m. St Andrew's, Canterbury (where he was churchwarden 1567), 14 Jan 1565, **Joanna Kittall** (b. c. 1544; bur. Kingstone 4 May 1611; will pr. 8 May), 'of London', and he was bur. Arms: *Or, a chevron gules between three lions' gambes erect and erased sable.*
Crest: *on a mural coronet or, a buck sejant, argent, attired or.*
(Visitation of Kent, 1619)⁶¹

The Austens or Austins were sheep-farmers and clothiers in the Weald of Kent. This branch are recorded at Adisham, Kent, from the late fifteenth century, where they settled at Court Lodge and many of the family are buried in the chancel of the church of the Holy Innocents. Jane Austen, the novelist, descends from a branch settled at Yalding, Kent, at the same period. The Neames intermarried frequently with the Austens, Nethersoles, Solleys and Dennes, and adopted Austen as a Christian name. Alice Austen married Roger Neame of Woodnesborough about 1440.

- A. Robert Austen**, of Adisham, Kent, b. Wickhambreaux, Kent, c. 1479; m. c. 1504 **Elizabeth** (d. Adisham, Oct 1538); and he d. Adisham, bur. 26 Nov 1544 (will pr. 5 Jan 1545; named in his will were his sons Thomas, Richard, Valentine and John), having had:
- B1. A daughter, b. Adisham, 1506.
 - B2. Thomas Austen, b. Adisham, 1508, and had sons Richard and Robert.
 - B3. Richard Austen, of Adisham, yeoman; b. c. 1515; intervened with his brother Thomas against John Bland, rector of Adisham, 1553;⁶² an appraiser of the inventory of John Austen of Chillenden 1567 (PRC 28/1, f.39r & v); occurs bond Jun 1568 (SAS/A613); born Wickhambreaux c. 1512; m. Adisham 1536 or 1538 Agnes a'Denne (b. Barham, Kent, 1520; d. Adisham, where buried on 28 March 1588), a lineal descendant of

There followed a succession of partnerships. He founded the firm of Cotterill & Francis (partnership dissolved 31 Dec 1790), subsequently 1 July 1795 entering into partnership with Thomas Ketland (of Philadelphia, USA) 'for the collection of hardwares, buttons, buckles, and all other articles manufactured in this and the neighbouring towns, and exported to the United States of North America and elsewhere'. His sons William and Thomas successively joined the partnership, first trading as Ketland, Cotterill, & Son (partnership dissolved Dec. 1802), then as Clement Cotterill & Sons (partnership dissolved 1806); in 1825, following his daughter Mary's marriage, the firm traded as Scholefield & Sons.

Annery, Monkleigh, near Bideford, N.
